THE HARVEST

We come again to the harvest season when all of us, directly and indirectly, will share in the labors of this blessed season. Our farm families will know early mornings and long nights, as collectively, each person has an important role to patiently play as the work is undertaken and completed. Even those who may not directly be involved in the harvest season play their part by supporting the work of this season by things like consciously sharing the road or offering a word or prayer of encouragement and gratitude. Because we all share in this season, let's take a moment to reflect on what the Bible teaches about the concept of harvest.

Let's acknowledge that the harvest season represents the continuing grace of God's promise to bless and fill the earth. After the fall of man into sin and corruption, God did not cease to bless Adam's labors to be fruitful and fill the earth. The nature of Adam's work became more taxing (does anyone know that reality – hard work!?) but

God's blessing was still to be seen. God re-affirms that pledge through the Noahic Covenant. Among the promises of the Noahic Covenant, including the oath not to curse the ground because of man, or strike down every living creature, or flood the earth with water, is this seasonal pledge: While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease (Gen 8:22). Seedtime and harvest will not cease, and this is God's grace.

During Harvest

GOD, our heavenly Father, who by Thy gracious providence hast made the earth to bring forth her fruits for our use in this Thine appointed time; we most humbly beseech Thee to bless this season, that the harvest Thou hast bestowed may be safely gathered in, for the comfort of Thy children, and the glory of Thy name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.

There was no single harvest time in ancient Israel. Olives were harvested September–November, flax March–April, barley April–May, and wheat May–June. Fruits such as figs and grapes were harvested at the end of the summer, in August or September. The Israelites' calendar revolved very much around the harvest periods (cf. <u>Jgs 15:1</u>; <u>Ruth 1:22</u>). In the OT, harvest was one of the three major feasts which the Israelites were required by the Lord to keep annually (<u>Ex 23:16</u>). In doing so they would remember that the rich land into which they had been brought from Egypt (<u>Dt 8:7–10</u>) was the gift of God. In offering the first fruits of the harvest (<u>Lev 23:10-11</u>) the Israelites showed gratitude and acknowledged their dependence on the Lord.

In the New Testament the emphasis on the harvest shifts from the agricultural harvest to a harvest of souls claimed for the Kingdom of God through faith in Jesus Christ. This is what Jesus meant when He said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest" (Mt 9:37-38). It's a vivid picture for the church to remember that as the grain is brought in from the fields, so too are there souls to be harvested for God's Kingdom, not by means of the combine, but through the proclamation of the Gospel.

So as we live in, and give thanks for this season, let us remember the ordinary providences of God's care and provision through the faithful labors of our farmers, and let us also be mindful that we are likewise called to join in the labors of the spiritual harvest to the glory of God. I wish you all a safe and blessed harvest season to you and your family as,

The August Session meeting was held August 31st, 2021, at 7pm in the conference room of the church with TE Zach Hopkins and RE's Jim Mueller, Kevin Oak, Mic Penry, and Patrick Shovar present. RE Keith Wilson was excused. A quorum was present.

Pastor Zach acted as moderator of the meeting and opened the meeting with prayer. He then read from 1 Corinthians 10:1-5. The Elders prayed for individual members of the congregation then studied and discussed the Westminster Confession of Faith, Chapter 28: "Baptism".

Approval/Amendment of Docket: Motion was made and seconded to approve the docket. Motion carried.

Approval of Minutes: July 27th, 2021 minutes were reviewed. Motion made, seconded and approved.

Correspondence: No new correspondence.

Zach's Report: Zach reported on members with health concerns and prayer needs. During the past month he conducted 2 office visits, 4 home visits, and participated in various church actives in addition to moderating the Trinity Presbyterian Church (Sparta, IL) Session Meeting, leading a weekly Bible study at Brookstone (Aledo, IL), and conducting a training session with the Youth Hope staff.

Old Business:

- The Nominating Committee has met and reached out to candidates.
- The Shepherding Meeting was originally scheduled for December 5th, 2020 and postponed due to COVID. The Session was unable to meet on June 12th, 2021 due to the Rursch funeral. This is currently tabled.
- "Outreach & Evangelism" topic regarding Deacons and Mission.
- VBS Summary Report was reviewed. Thank you to Kathy Stegmiller.
- Zach provided an update regarding the Brookstone Bible Study. RE Shovar and RE Mueller led the study on August 25th.
- Updates to the Church Directory are being researched by Lisa Bowman.
- The Food Pantry and Ice Cream Social events were reviewed by the Session. Gratitude was especially expressed to Shirley Flemming and Tara Johnson.
- Tara Johnson conducted Acolyte Training during Sunday School on August 29th. We have already seen increased participation.
- EEPC Delegates to the 33rd meeting of Rivers & Lakes Presbytery (10/1-2/21) will be RE Shovar and RE Wilson with RLP Moderator RE Penry and TE Hopkins also attending.
- Zach's upcoming calendar includes:
 - o MCC/MVC committees at the GA office in Orlando, Florida September 8-10
 - Theology Committee at the GA office in Orlando, Florida October 25-27

New Business:

- Discussion regarding current state of the pandemic. It was M/S/C to update the congregation regarding the use of masks being "recommended" but not to take additional action at this time. Session will solicit feedback and continue to closely monitor the situation.
- M/S/C to disburse 2021 PMA contributions in the amounts of: \$4,645 to GA; \$3,434 to RLP. TE Hopkins will prepare the documentation and submit to Cindy Oak for payment.

- M/S/C to approve scholarship requests in the amount of \$500 each to applicants: Nathan Flickinger, Mackenzie Reimers, Colby Mueller, Reilly Fuller, and Kira Nelson. TE Hopkins will prepare the documentation and submit to Cindy Oak for payment.
- TE Derek Morrison will be preaching on September 26th as TE Hopkins will be in Minneapolis for the baptism of his niece. The Elders will conduct the service.
- The Harvest Party is schedule for October 10th at 7pm in the north parking lot.
- Communication about the 2021-2022 Communicant's Class is being distributed in the next week. A parent meeting will be held October 3rd.
- A Fall Adult Membership Class was discussed along with hopeful attendees.


Communion will be held on September 5th. The next Stated Session meeting will be: September 28th, 2021 at 7:00pm.

When Abortion seems like the "only" option...

Almost every day, women walk through our doors who are seriously considering or planning for an abortion. When asked why, here are some of her most common answers...

"I am scared." "I am alone." "I cannot handle, afford, or take care of another child." "It's not the right time." "It's not the right person." "This is not what I had planned for my life... at least right now."

Our culture makes it increasingly easier and more acceptable for pregnancy termination to occur. These days a pill (or medical) abortion can be delivered to your front door or retrieved from your doctor's office. But the consequences of that choice can be complicated, devastating, and lasting. Recently Anne* came to our center looking for help – pregnant again just months after her pill abortion and thinking some of those very same things. Anne was scared. Anne was in crisis. The life of this pre-born hung in the balance. You made the difference in the life of this mom! YOU made sure that the help she needed was available (read more about Anne on the next page). Your gift today will help provide honest and compassionate care, medically accurate options education, and life-affirming ultrasounds to other moms just like Anne.

ANNE'S STORY PART 1... PAM WHITE, MOLINE CENTER DIRECTOR

Recently, I met with Anne*, a client determined to have an abortion. With a 3-year-old child at home, Anne said she was not ready for another child. Sadly, Anne had chosen to abort a previous pregnancy just a few months earlier. She had used RU486 (the abortion pill) that resulted in some complications requiring a follow-up surgical abortion. As we met, Anne expressed concern about how a second abortion so soon would cause complications for her. I could see the emotion on her face as we discussed her options. Anne was convinced that she "had" to have an abortion.

Anne's partner Mike* waited in the reception area where one of our male volunteers had the opportunity to talk with him. He seemed to be disengaged and didn't want to talk. After the pregnancy test was completed, Mike joined Anne but didn't participate in the conversation. Mike is both the father of the aborted child and the father of the child being discussed now. Mike didn't make eye contact and seemed willing to leave the decision up to Anne.

I wrapped up the appointment, feeling like there was nothing I could do or say that would help them to see that this child had value. This couple had already experienced an abortion with complications but seemed determined to abort again. I set them up for an ultrasound, waited, and prayed that God would intervene, and they would choose life.

ANNE'S STORY PART 2... BETH BILL, R.N., STAFF NURSE

Serving as the center nurse, I was able to meet with Anne* and Mike* for their scheduled ultrasound appointment about two weeks later. Anne seemed happy and relaxed as I called her name and took her to the ultrasound room. Before discussing her medical history, I asked how she was feeling about the pregnancy and if she was still considering an abortion. Right away Anne answered back with a broad smile that she was going to have the baby. Since the patient notes indicated that Anne had presented as strongly abortion-minded at her pregnancy test appointment, I asked her what had changed. She explained that she and Mike finally made the

time to talk through the pregnancy and they decided they wanted to have the baby. **Anne said that abortion was off the table and no longer an option.** When it was time to see the baby on the screen, Mike was brought into the room....

S.... also had a good week camping with the youth group kids, including our kids. It was nice for him to get to know friends of our kids, and also had chances for deeper discussion with the guys there about his talks on grace. He said one kid got very excited when realizing that God loves him and he doesn't have to actually gain that favor in any way. Pray for these kids too, as they start school again and are examples of faith in their classes. Pray for J.... specifically - he is very intentional in talking about what he believes, and has had good discussions with his classmates in the past.

A couple weeks ago our team and another local mission group did a day trip with the ESL class ladies and their families to G....... Park. We walked through the park, had a picnic, played some games, and rode the ferry boat back to T.... It was a good chance to chat with the ladies outside of class and get to know their children and build some relationships. They also all brought along homemade sweets to share - which was wonderful!

S.... had a good trip to B...... with one of our church plant teammates. He learned alot of Sylheti over the weekend, got to see some local ministries in B....., and enjoyed getting to know our teammate more.

The last couple weeks of August we tried to intentionally slow down and do things as a family, visit local parks a bit more, and spend time with teammates and friends. I think it was a good time of relaxing and refreshing before jumping back into work in September.

The beginning of September will be spent doing a lot of planning. We will be going away with our church plant team for a weekend of planning together, and we will also be taking three days as a Serge team to plan and pray for the coming year. Please be praying for us in this, that we can have unity and gentleness as we all share thoughts and ideas together. And pray that God guides our plans so that we are doing the work that He sees most valuable.

ESOL classes will start up again at the end of this month. Please pray for more students, now that pandemic rules will let us have more consistency in classes, and pray for the planning and the teachers.

Pray also as all our other ministry things pick up again - Book tables, lunch clubs, boxing outreach, meetings for better understanding with local mosques, and plans for weekly Asha services!

CHURCH PLANTING AND PARENTING: DIRTY YET REWARDING JOBS

Lancaster's - Chicago 7/20 Vision - This is a VERY lengthy update. To read it all, click HERE

...It's in the drawn-out unrelenting process of doing the dirty work in birthing and raising kids and churches that your heart is caught up in a big love. Even though the costs are great and the work is exhausting, that's the price you pay to be a part of seeing new life spring forth in God's world by his grace and all to his glory....

That leads me to share with you that our main new focus is intentionally working to recruit mission-minded Christians who might feel called to help us get started. You might ask, "how are you seeking to do that?" Well, the need for church planting in Chicago is massive. The cool thing is that most of the solid evangelical (that's the historic usage of the term evangelical not modern politicized use of that term) churches all want to share resources so we can collectively labor in the Christ-focused work of church planting in our great city. At present, I've begun meeting with some of these leaders trying to put together a game plan to borrow (that's right, I said borrow) some of their church members to help me form a launch team to expedite our process a bit. It takes critical mass to draw people. My church planting coach advised me to borrow people who are willing to serve as the scaffolding for our mission – once the wall, so to speak, of the church plant, gets built, the scaffolding can come down and the members of this borrowed launch team can return to their home churches. So far, the 4 church leaders with whom I've met have shown a positive response to the idea and are considering how we might borrow some of their people. There's still hard work to do to figure things out, but we're slowly but surely making incremental advances.

The Game Plan is:

- * Recruit potential launch team members Aug. 2021-January 2022
- * Train Launch Team February-March 2022
- * Lead an Easter Worship Service April 17, 2022
- * Have monthly prototype worship services May-August 2022 with weekly informal fellowship gatherings in between
- * Launch weekly worship gatherings September 11, 2022

I remain convinced of the crucial nature of church planting in general in our country and church planting in particular in Chicago (obviously the need is global also!). Some of us need to keep partnering in the dirty work because there's a desperate need for Christ's church to birth new life.

The Chicagoland Church Planting Alliance just released a preliminary report in which they have worked to assess the church landscape in Chicago's 77 neighborhoods. A big part of the purpose of this project was to discern the neighborhoods in the city most underserved by the church. Any neighborhood with a church-to-population ratio of less than 1:1000 is considered underserved. To extrapolate a bit, there would be below (in many cases well below) 10 churches for every 10,000 people in these underserved neighborhoods. For me, what leaped off the page when I read the report was when I saw our target area made the list of the top 5 most underserved neighborhoods in Chicago. In other words, we're planting in one of the least churched areas of a very under-churched city.

Prayer Requests

- For God's sustaining grace as we seek to persevere in the rigorous and rewarding work of Church planting. For the
 Holy Spirit to keep beautifying Christ in our hearts and continually giving us animated imaginations regarding
 Christ's healing kingdom mission in the world.
- For our missionary Christ to keep opening up doors of opportunity to grow our relationship network. For Jesus to help us share his love and the good news of the gospel (in word and action) with our new friends.
- For God to use the pandemic to awaken people to himself and to the mission God is on to redeem and restore the world through his Son. For God to cause the impact of the COVID pandemic to subside.
- For the body of Christ to work together to embody Christ's life and love in our city. For the peace of Christ to spread in Chicago.
- For startling conversions to Christ
- For God to help us find times to experience his rest during the stress of planting a church and establishing an art gallery business.
- For the Lord to deepen our love for one another as we continue our respective works together.






