



Every Single Member Matters

Church membership is a topic that is on my mind lately. It probably has a lot to do with the exciting groups of new members that are joining our church; a group of adults at the end of October, and the youth communicant's class that will be joining during the spring of 2022. These new members are an exciting and encouraging thing to see as our church family grows. In a time when many churches report that membership is no longer a meaningful category of belonging, it is important to remember that this is exactly how the Apostle Paul explains what it means to be a part of the Church. He teaches that to belong to the Church is to be a member of the Body of Christ (<u>1 Cor 12:12-27</u>). The point is there is both the reality of the individual member, or in that particular analogy, an individual body part; but there is also a larger entity, the entirety of the body. In other words, there is an individual, and a way in which that individual is a part of a larger community – the Church. That belonging is expressed in terms of membership. So, as we say in our adult class, membership does matter!

Considering this reflection on the meaning and significance of church membership, it's important to remember that *every member matters*. Every person is a part of the Body. There is no degree of rank or importance that classifies our membership. Each is a part of the whole in such a way that without any one member, we are an incomplete body. Read it again, *every single member matters*.

One of the ways this comes home to me in a meaningful way is how many of the New Testament letters conclude by greeting specific church members. For example, at the end of Romans, which is arguably Paul's most masterful and eloquent exposition of the gospel, he takes time in the concluding chapters to greet over thirty specific members of the church in Rome. We might conclude from that, that these were the thirty most important people in the church – right? But the beautiful thing is that apart from their names being named, with a few exceptions, we know very little to nothing at all about these folks. They are just ordinary members, but even that isn't a great way to say it.

There is no such thing as someone who is *just a member*. Every member, regardless of who they are, regardless of whether their name is publicized or not, is a part of the Kingdom expanding work of the Lord Jesus in the local church. Take for example: Urbanus, Tryphaena, Tryphosa, and Persis, who were labeled workers in the Lord (Rom 16:9, 12); and Mary and Persis, who are called those who worked hard (Rom 16:6, 12). What did they do? I have no idea. But what I tend to think is that they were occupied in the ordinary tasks of church membership, which are actually extraordinary aspects of Kingdom work, and so they were honored for it. I wonder if it was like taking out the trash, or making the coffee, or even holding the door open and greeting someone with a friendly smile. I'm quite sure it looked a bit different, but I like to think, in general, that it was those kinds of ordinary services that were considered the faithful work of the Church in Rome. It reminds us that every member, every single one, is an important part of the ministry of the Gospel.

We're going to be thinking more about these truths in the month of November. There are a few weeks sandwiched between the conclusion of our Apostles' Creed series and the beginning of Advent 2021 where we will consider some truths about membership in the Church of Jesus Christ. I hope these reflections will be encouraging to you and deepen your sense of belonging to Church Family. I look forward to seeing you all on the Lord's Day.

SESSION

Old Business:

- <u>Mission Updates:</u>
 - → Youth Hope: (Deb) YH's greatest need at this time is volunteers for the many programs and services on their calendar. Deb attended the Volunteer workshop and shared the many opportunities with the team. Deb will contact YH to see if Edgington EPC could sponsor one program or service to assist. She will update at the next meeting.
 - → Pregnancy Resources: (Barb) The September walk fundraiser was very well attended and they were able to raise over \$45,000.
 - → Winnie's Place: (Nancy) a group of EPC volunteers met at Winnie's Place on Saturday, Sept. 25th, to help clean one of their apartments.  - → Saul & Jess Huber: (Kevin) Jess was able to safely deliver her child and is recuperating from COVID.
 - → Jeff Lancaster: (Lisa) The Mission team received a very nice letter from Jeff Lancaster fully outlining his challenges and small successes in planting churches in Chicago. Prayers are needed for patience and strength as he continues his work.
 - → Christian Care: (Jim) CC is asking for more involvement from EEPC. Barb will give Jim a call to reach out and see what their needs are at this time. We will address this further at our October meeting.

SAFE, LEGAL, AND RARE NO MORE...

As recently as 20 years ago, the marching cry "SAFE, LEGAL, and RARE" united abortion supporters across the United States. Today pro-abortion activists believe the word RARE to be an aggressive attempt and shaming women who are post-abortive and have moved to an updated position "SAFE and LEGAL" unlimited, unrestricted, fully funded. There is perhaps no other cultural issue that divides us more. Those who cling to the truth that life – all life – is precious and should be protected are belittled, ridiculed, inaccurately labeled, and shunned. We are seeing this escalating conflict to protect the pre-born unfold across the country. While some states, like Iowa, seek to protect the pre-born, we need not look far to see how vulnerable the pre-born of Illinois and Iowa remain.

On a local level, in early October a Women's Rally took place in Rock Island, Illinois. This rally specifically focused on legalized abortion with guest appearances from the Mayor of Moline, a Rock Island County Board Member, the President of the NAACP of Rock Island County, and several other community leaders speaking out in support of abortion. To my knowledge, there were no life-affirming speakers at this event.

On the Federal level, in September the U.S. House passed the misleadingly named Women's Health Protection Action. If approved by the Senate, this legislation would almost fully remove all current and future restrictions on abortion and prevent states from even limited protections for the preborn. Limits on third trimester abortions and current bans on sex-selection abortions would also be removed. State laws requiring informed consent would be nullified. Parental notification for minors to purchase an abortion and pre-abortion fetal development education requirements would also be removed. Doctors, nurses, and hospitals would no longer be allowed to refuse abortion procedures for ethical or religious reasons. In short, this is the MOST extreme abortion legislation ever considered or passed by the U.S. House of Representatives.

On the National level, the Supreme Court of the United States is set to hear oral arguments in early December 2021 for Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization. This case addresses a Mississippi law banning most abortions after 15 weeks. This case could challenge the Roe v. Wade decision of 1973. This famous ruling stated that a woman had constitutional right to terminate a pregnancy in the first six months of her pregnancy, – when survival outside the womb was not possible. We now know that children can be born as early as 21 weeks 2 days and survive with the assistance of advanced medical care.

So, what are **you and I to do?** We pray without ceasing – for our local leaders, our national leaders, for those who deny the value of life, and for each mom and dad who, today, is facing an unplanned or unwanted pregnancy. We <u>speak up for life</u> – in our homes, in our churches, and within our circles of influence. We get involved – volunteer, pray over the ministry, and financially support front line ministries like Pregnancy Resources. Finally, <u>we vote</u> for men and women who will act in the best interest of us all – including the preborn. Remember, **even in this huge battle for the pre-born, we are not alone**; it is God who directs us in this spiritual, political, and cultural battle on behalf of every pre-born child out there.

 difficult situations and considering abortion. Pray for wisdom for those who see clients to know what to say and

- Pray for the two abortion-minded clients with whom we have lost contact. Pray that they would know that we are a safe place for them regardless of their decision.
- Pray for a client who recently took the abortion pill. Pray that she would know God's comfort and know where she can get help when she needs it.

A WORLD IN CONFLICT

"I feel it is my duty to plod on, while daylight shall last..." - Adoniram Judson

The picture above is a snapshot of the peril currently afflicting the people of Burma (Myanmar). Following a military coup in February, 2021 the country has been besieged with violence, oppression, and uncertainty. Covid has hit the country particularly hard, and vaccines are scant and expensive. Fuel and food prices have increased,

and churches have not been allowed to meet for over a year. This week, we had a chance to speak with our national ministry partners in the country for a time of encouragement and prayer. It proved to be a somber reminder of the suffering many of our brothers and sisters are facing at this moment in history.

And Burma is just one of our ITEN sites that is enduring struggles in the current moment. Ethiopia is experiencing a civil war in the north of the country, our Russian partners are forced to find creative ways to work within the ever -changing government restrictions, and Vietnam is battling yet another wave of illness and death from the Delta variant, while the Middle East is watching the return of the Taliban to power, and the entire continent of Africa remains less than 5% vaccinated.

Undoubtedly, this is changing the work of ITEN and challenging us to pray more earnestly for discernment and wisdom regarding the next steps we will take, and what role God would have us play in his unfolding story of redemption for a world in conflict. A world who needs to hear about the Prince of Peace perhaps now more than ever.

Vietnam

With the resurgence of the Delta variant in Southeast Asia, our October training session in Vietnam has been delayed again. While attempts will be made to hold a virtual training in November, the most plausible outcome is that we will plan to gather with students face-toface in March of 2022.

Over the past year I have been working with our national partners in Sierra Leone to redesign our strategic plan within the country. Like many parts of Africa, economic struggles combined with a pandemic, and political upheavals have demanded a shift in the way we conduct theological education with pastors in rural areas of the country. With new program coordinators in place, and a fresh vision for the coming year, our desire is

to be back in-country in January 2022, relaunching a multi-year ministry certificate for pastors within the Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Sierra Leone.

On Labor Day Ed finally was able to rest from his composing labors as the O.T. Survey materials were completed and the last segments sent to V..... for translation. A huge sigh of relief and praise! Later that evening, in Zoom meeting with our Southeast Asia team, we heard of increasing Covid cases accompanied by serious food shortages mainly in the southern part of the nation. In the north by the capital, increased measures were in place to stop the spread of the virus. With travel and meeting size restrictions in place the team



realized that the October classes needed to be on hold. Discussions continue for updates. Classes will be scheduled as soon as the situation in country allows.

Following the March classes some participants have been able to pass the training along; many have been stymied by Covid restrictions. Nationally Covid numbers are coming down with a 7 day average of 971 cases and 263 deaths which is more than 25% mortality rate. The economy has taken a huge hit as tourism, a major industry, has virtually stopped. Industry in the south has greatly slowed. The US is sending vaccines as are other nations.

Pray for all pastors and church leaders as they shepherd their people and reach outward. The pressing need is to pray for Covid relief. Wisdom in planning for ongoing training both from those we've trained already and for our next classes.

Our Southeast Asian partners in M...... are rejoicing at the healing of Mr T, the leader "of the Pack," from Covid along with his wife, son, and daughter. Mr. T's nurse, a Buddhist, heard the gospel while caring for him and put her trust in Jesus! She has returned home as a new believer to witness to her family. Please pray for T's Nurse to grow in her faith and be a bold witness. It is hard to find good Covid stats so we are continuing to pray for containment and healing. Thankfully ITEN gets funds sent & received for Covid relief supplies. Conditions around the country are gut-wrenching. Civil unrest continues almost 8 months after the Military Coup. Many innocent people are caught in the literal crossfire. Making a living is very challenging bringing hunger to many. Please continue to pray for civil peace and justice. For the Holy Spirit to revel the truth of salvation to all elements of society.

On the home front both of us are participating the EPC World Outreach's workshop Loving your Muslim Neighbors taught by experienced members of World Outreach. Nan is hosting a cohort group of 11 at our church both in person and online, part of the 28 participating from around the country. It has been fun to see EPC friends. Three of the Gargiulo family from Fellowship Church of South Lyons, Michigan, Doug Dempsey of Faith EPC in Brooksville, Florida, and Jane Bodden from Hope Community Church, Pembroke Pines, FL. Following up on a homework assignment we joined a class couple for lunch at the Khyber Halal restaurant in our neighborhood and reconnected with a waitress we had prayed with a few years back. Her husband has returned safely from Afghanistan where he served 2 years as a translator. Praise God! May the Lord give His Church guidance on how to love those who are lost. Grow us, O Lord, to see possibilities around us where you want us to bring life's hope.

Nan is in the application process with the IRC (International Refugee Committee) to volunteer as a transit trainer for adult refugees coming into Phoenix. She has no experience here on buses/light rail, but both of us have wanted to learn this system. Now is our chance! Interview is done, background check in process. Open the door please, Lord, for her.

We have been spending time with 2 young couples who don't mind socializing with "older" folks. It is quite refreshing. A ministry-focused engaged couple will tie their marital knot Thanksgiving weekend. Nan met Samantha in an area park and struck up a conversation. One thing lead to another, realizing their shared faith and teaching careers has led to a delightful mentoring relationship.

The second is an immigrant couple who both found that Islam didn't answer their life questions. Conversation topics vary greatly. The challenges of living outside their passport country, how to develop a bi-cultural family life, zipping through his job's tasks and how to ask for more work, how to find tennis partners, dealing with differences in a potential marital partner, the differences between Hell and Heaven, and acknowledging that Jesus is integral in our lives. Sunday we stopped to pray a blessing for the meal and blessing the man's apartment. She commented that was a favorite part of getting together. We later asked if we could pray for healing in Jesus' name for the woman's painful back issue. She was very appreciative.
