



## Immanuel or Emmanuel?

Have you ever noticed that the same name is written two different ways? Is it with an “I” or an “E?” You’re not wrong whichever you choose. Immanul is a transliteration of the original Hebrew word composed of “Immanu” (with us) and “El” (God), while Emmanuel is a transliteration of the Greek word “Emmanouel.” The translation that we use at Edgington avoids this confusion by preferring the OT rendering in the NT as well. But just in case you’ve ever wondered, that’s why the carol is called “O Come, O Come Emmanuel” with an “E.”

### “O Come, O Come Emmanuel”

Well – now that I have that out of the way – let me offer some reflections on that wonderful hymn we know and love, to help us prepare our hearts for this beautiful time of year. It’s one that I think is able to capture the sensation of yearning and the longing that the season of Advent is all about - *O Come, O Come Emmanuel*. The words were written in Germany during the year 1710, more than 200 years after the music which was originally composed in 15th century France. We owe gratitude to John Mason Neale (1864) who is responsible for the version most widely known and sung in modern times.

The lyrics are arranged around five petitions which are intended to communicate something very important, both about the season of Advent and the Christian life. In the present age of redemptive history, the Christian life oscillates between two realities: the overflowing joy of our redemption and membership in the Kingdom of God, which is **already** a reality (Eph 1:7), and the tearful yearning for the full consummation of the Kingdom of God, which is **not-yet** (Rom 8:18; Eph 4:30). The already and the not-yet. Christ has come and we rejoice! But in another sense, He is yet to come, and for that we express our longing. It’s that mingled sense of the Christian life that Paul speaks of when he says that we are “sorrowful, yet always rejoicing” (2 Cor 6:10).

This grand drama of Kingdom inauguration and consummation is revealed in *O Come, O Come Emmanuel* through the various titles ascribed to Jesus. Each one captures something of the “already, not yet” sense of our redemption.

- As **Emmanuel** (Isaiah 8:8), “God with us” — He will pay the ransom that only a God-man can pay.
- As the **Rod of Jesse** (Isaiah 11:1) springing from a dead stump, He will free His people, by death and resurrection, from Satan’s tyranny, and make them free forever.
- As the **Day-Spring** (Luke 1:78), the dawn of God’s kingdom, He will be the light of the world and banish the hopelessness of darkness.
- As the **Key of David** (Isaiah 22:22), He rescues us from hell, locks the door behind us, unlocks the door of heaven, and brings us home.
- And as the **Desire of Nations** (Haggai 2:7), He will draw the ransomed from every people and make them a kingdom of peace.

When we sing these words, and especially these titles of who Jesus is, we are declaring what He has already achieved, and also the great work that He is yet to do. With every refrain, our weak and mournful hearts are pulled up into faith and joy – Rejoice! Emmanuel has come. Emmanuel will come. Rejoice!

It absolutely thrills my soul to celebrate this with you all! So, I want to encourage you to join us as we worship the Lord together. Whether on the Lord's Day, where we will be tracing the story of God's redemption through the women of Jesus' genealogy, or on Christmas Eve-evening for our Lessons & Carols service [12/24 – 5pm]. Come and worship our Triune God!

#### **New Business:**

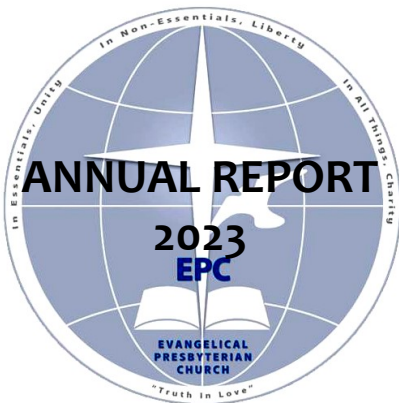
- Youth Leader Conference in Louisville, January 3<sup>rd</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup>, 2024.

## DIFFERENT TIMES & COMPLICATED ISSUES

“We live in different times.” It’s something we hear a lot, and it’s true. The world is different than when Pregnancy Resources opened our doors in 1990. **As times have changed, the ministry has grown and adapted, while affirming life choices.** Three locations, limited ultrasound care, mobile medical care, abortion pill reversal, post-abortion care, and male mentorship are all examples of how Pregnancy Resources has adapted to the needs of our community. Our clients have changed, too. Today’s clients are older and face more complicated issues. They are stuck in the culture of “anything goes” and “live in the moment.” Sexual activity outside of marriage is typical, single pregnancy is normal, and abortion is seen as “acceptable.”

Two recent examples come to mind. Sami\* has been coming to Pregnancy Resources since she was in high school. Now in her 20’s, Sami has several children with the same man. Tragically, domestic violence, infidelity, and drugs played a role in destroying this family. Now Sami is dating a woman and pregnant with another baby who will grow up without a father. Sadly, **this young woman’s dreams of an “intact family” have been shattered. She’s given up on the traditional family roles. While not considering abortion, this woman expresses a different kind of hopelessness. Pray the gospel shared with her will take root.**

Another client, Lola\*, has several children, all by different men. Each guy stayed a while then left when things got tough. Lola decided she’s better off without a man. She’s shut out the world and is focused on raising her children and working to support them. Lola believes in God, but believes that she can only rely on herself. **Lola, and others like her have “given up” on knowing a man who will support and love them in the way God intended.** Many believe that men simply will not stay to be involved or provide support for the family. **Pray that these women will come to know how much God loves them. Pray that these children will find healthy male role models to emulate.** Pray that our male volunteers will have opportunities to mentor some of these young men despite great opposition. **We know that God designed a different way for families. Daily we testify to God’s better way.**

## THE HUBER FAMILY - OUR NEPHEW SIMEON

Dearest Family & Friends,

In our annual paper mailing around Christmastime, we shared about our 3-year-old nephew, Simeon ("Simmy"), who has a rare form of leukemia... however, we realized haven't shared anything here. Just wanted to share an update with you all, as this has been a place of pain, suffering, and growth for Saul's entire family. Though there hasn't been much good news regarding Simmy's future, I believe each member of our family (including Simmy's) has seen their heart being formed even more to Christ's as we press into prayer, vulnerability, encouragement, and sharing of hope with those around us.



Here's a brief outline of events over the past year:

- August 2022 - Simmy diagnosed with Leukemia (one week after Seth and Jessie had their fifth child) and starts chemotherapy within a week
- September 2022 - They find out he has hypodiploidy, which makes his condition extremely rare
- October 2022 - Simmy is flown from Springfield to Children's Hospital in St. Louis due to complications and bleeding in one of his arteries and he undergoes two 7-hour plus surgeries in a week
- November 2022 to February 2023 - Continues chemotherapy. He's in and out of the hospital with various complications.
- March/April 2023 - Leukemia shows back up in his blood, so he starts an experimental treatment called Car T cell Therapy
- May/June 2023 - Goes through full body radiation treatments and bone marrow transplant.
- July 2023 - Doctors find extremely small amount of leukemia cells (2 in a million) left in blood.
- August 2023 - Biopsy shows that Simmy's leukemia grew significantly (3 in every 100 cells).

The aggressiveness of the cancer has been surprising and heartbreaking. My brother and his wife (Seth & Jessie) were given several medical options moving forward, but each one had next to zero chances of succeeding and would result in Simmy being in the hospital for the remainder of his young life, rather than at home with his family. After much prayer and tears and heartache, they made the difficult decision to take a maintenance and quality of life route. Here's a quote from one of my brother's recent Facebook posts:

*"This is dark, and hard, there's no real way to have complete peace in a situation that ultimately ends in the death of your child. Recently I read through the book of Job. It reads differently after you've experienced affliction and loss. In the beginning of the book, right after he loses everything he says two things... 'the Lord gives and the Lord takes away, blessed be the name of the Lord,' and 'why should we accept only good from God and not also adversity.' I feel like those things were easier to say a year ago when Simmy first got his diagnosis. I also know and believe the end of the book, where Job's fortunes are restored- it's a beautiful picture of Heaven and God fully and generously restoring us. But in between the beginning and end of the book, there's a long section filled with Job's questions and doubts. And honestly, that's where Jess and I are right now. I still believe God's promises and believe there's victory in the end, but the middle is hard. Please be praying for us as we process this together, and still have a full family to take care of, cherish, teach and prepare. Please pray for wisdom as we make decisions and prioritize what's truly important during this tough season."*

Tears come as I sit here writing. It's been over a year now, but it's still hard to soak in the reality of what the next 4-6 months will possibly bring. One of our missions co-workers said to me the other day, "Saul, your family is walking on holy ground. Don't leave us out." I've had to sit with that phrase "holy ground." This place isn't good, but it isn't ultimately bad either because of our hope and trust in Jesus. The word "Holy" means "set apart." We can trust that no matter how much (or how little) we understand, this season is set apart for God's glory and Simmy's ultimate good.

To those of you who already know Simmy's story, thanks a million times over for all the prayers and encouragements. To those of you hearing this for the first time, I'll resist the urge to apologize for bringing such a difficult story into your day, and instead ask you to pray for Simmy, his family and our extended family. We know that you all have your own stories of suffering and have found solace in the prayers and tears of fellow believers. Thank you. We love you all so much.

## THE HUBER FAMILY - IT WAS A COHORT KIND OF SUMMER

In June of this summer, we loaded our five kids into our trusty (and very packed) mini-van, Rhoda Toyota, and drove out to Denver, Colorado for the EPC's annual general assembly conference. We've actually attended this event every year since 2017... in different locations and with varying numbers of children as we've added more each year. EPC General Assembly (GA) is easily our biggest World Outreach mobilization event and we work hard for months leading up to the week, planning events, making promotional materials, networking, leading events, preparing missionaries to be commissioned and helping them tell their stories to the church leaders there. This year though... it was EXTRA special... we brought some of our Cohort students for the first time!



Back in the beginning of 2020, we helped start EPC WO Mission Cohorts, a year long discipleship program for young adults (mostly college students) that are interested in missions. Since then we've had roughly 40-45 young adults participate in this program, and can't even begin to tell you how humbled and blessed we've been to walk alongside these passionate and mature Christ followers! When the program began, we thought that these college students would be at least 5-10 years (or more) from going overseas if God so called them, but in the Lord's providence and timing, five have already landed on the field or started the missionary application process with WO!

Okay, now back to this summer...Two of the five students just mentioned were commissioned at GA as World Outreach global workers and have already begun their service on the mission field... one in the Middle East and one in Central Asia, both working amongst unreached people groups!

Something else that made this GA so special is that World Outreach leadership gave us the green light to bring a group of cohort students/alumni to the conference to host a cohort lunch event and help out with mobilization. These eight students infused the week with excitement and passion as they shared stories of how God has worked in their hearts and lives as they seek to be faithful senders, mobilizers, and goers. Some told testimonies of Muslims coming to Christ during our Cohort trip to Jordan, others told of how deep/lifelong friendships have developed from the cohort community, and one young woman even shared about how God used her time in the cohort to bring her out of a deep depression. Glory to God!

Thank you for partnering with us in equipping and sending out these passionate young Christ followers! Please be praying for our newest cohort that kicked off in August. Mission Cohort Five (or MC5 as we call it) has 10 college students in the group participating from seven different states, and one country (a missionary kid in Scotland)! You can pray specifically for MC5 students as many of them are currently support raising/shifting winter schedules to join us this January at Cross Con, a missions conference in Louisville, KY that focuses on reaching frontier people groups around the world.

Feels like October flew by! We had visitors for a big part of the month, so we took some time off, played tourist, and had some good family times... We enjoyed hosting my cousin and cousin in law for a couple days - they are our first overnight family visitors! It was wonderful to show them the city and also reconnect and laugh and be together. Then we had C.... here for 10 days! It's been almost a year since seeing him last, and was wonderful to have the time with him. Were even able to take a weekend trip north and have the whole family together for a few days.

Work wise - S.... has had a busy schedule with tutoring ESOL, the bookshop and long talks there, and book tables (which have had a few more heated arguers lately). Colleen has been spending time with teens - at school lunch and afterschool clubs, and also doing art - at both a drop in and as a connecting point with those we know.

We changed our clocks this weekend and are suddenly aware of the darkness of winter here - but also the joy of Christmas coming and of Thanksgiving this month. We have lots to be thankful for - the joy of knowing Jesus, and being able to share that, and also the blessing and gift of being part of a global church body. One of the joys of being supported by all of you is the feeling of connection and family - and knowing that you all are part of what we do here as well. Know that we are grateful for all of you and that we thank God for you!

...We finished the mural at girl's club, and had a great time talking with a couple older girls doing the last touchup bits. Continue to pray for opportunities to have deeper conversations about faith with the club girls - and also pray for more girls to join. Along with this - pray for the lunch clubs in schools and ways to be a loving presence to those girls, and also that some of those girls would want to come along to the afterschool club.

Asha services have had great conversations in the women's groups especially lately- it is encouraging that they are understanding the Matthew passages and wanting to engage with it. Pray for changed hearts as they understand more and more.

We still pray for more children and families to come to Asha regularly- please pray for that with us. And pray for the kids of the plant team as they grow in faith. These kids all attend schools with few, if any, other Christians- pray for them to grow in confidence of what they believe and knowledge of God's presence with them.

The art drop in has started and has had just a couple ladies come, but they have enjoyed the time. Pray that this would be a comfortable space for women to come and be together, and for continued good conversations about life and faith as we are there.

Continue to pray for S.... as he leads as an elder in Asha - for wisdom in that for him and the other elders.

Pray for the relationships S.... is developing through ESOL and at the bookshop - that these would deepen and grow in convos about faith. Pray especially for A and H.

### Family prayer requests:

It was really great being together with all the kids, but has now been hard in the goodbyes as well. Pray for our hearts as parents as we see our kids grow and go out on their own- we love to see it, but also miss them!

S.... was able to spend a few days in Newcastle at a Presbyterian conference this past weekend- he enjoyed connecting with other Presbyterians and also getting some great teaching and refreshing time. Pray for him to continue to grow in awareness of God's presence and work in his heart and in our work here. (can actually pray that for all of us- S.... just wrote it out so well :)

J..... is finishing up university applications with a lot of tests this week, and turning in the application this month- please continue to pray for him and his future plans.

A..... has a ballet exam this month- she's been working hard on learning the dances and steps, but is concerned about what if she fails. We really don't think she will, but pray for her and learning where to put her trust and identity, and knowing God loves her no matter what!

As we see the violence in this fallen world, we pray for peace and pray for healing. With the situation in Israel and Palestine, we see a lot of emotions in our area. Pray that we can respond with wisdom and with love when asked about the issue, in a way that honors and points to God. And pray especially for J..... at school, where there is a lot of debate often.



## MCCALLUM MUSE NOVEMBER & BEYOND

### *A Season Ending and another Redeployment*

**We are being released and redeployed with reduced pressure January 1, 2024.** Many of you are saying...."Yup, McCallum's aren't ready to retire" -- and you are correct. We are ready to ease up on the accelerator. Our World Outreach relationship will be as Mission Associates....a newly created option within World Outreach. **ITEN will still be a major focus.**

The general plan is to **reduce yearly travel to two** global trips to... working as **coaches for the next team of teachers.** Ed won't be creating new curriculum, but updating formatting to aid reading comprehension. These materials are being offered to other countries to increase the training of leaders who will train others -- ITEN's goal! In April, Nan is co-leading a trip to a... island setting's Business as Mission project through the Presbytery of the West (EPC regional area of the US we're in). Spots are waiting for 5 people...**could that be you?**

**Nan** is in process of being **released** from ten years in World Outreach's **Child Safety Office.** Her replacement, Martha Halbedl, takes over November 11th. Thank you for your prayers for this gifted woman. Please **pray for Martha's transition. Pray that the transfer goes smoothly.** Nan steps away from a meaningful experience in leading the effort of safeguarding minors and protecting adults from false charges of abuse. This frees Nan for new things.

Together we are **adding a redeployment to the city around us,** primarily to people from global areas where the good news of new life in Jesus hasn't gotten to their ears. Perhaps international students and refugees. We've been connecting with people and groups we've met over the years and we are asking the Lord to connect the dots. We will keep you updated.

**What's on the immediate ITEN horizon?** We have 3 trips rolled into one. Leaving the evening of November 11 and returning December 10 in time to set up for Christmas. A dear young couple will be staying at the house and our son John's, McCallum's Pool Service and Repair will take care of the pool. He has grown his business to 17 employees! **Pray for productive days** of checking tasks off our lists before we leave.

- First to Panama for GPro Congress -- *Multiplying the Quality and Quantity of Trainers of Pastors.* We'll join 800+ global leaders in theological education in discussions of how to expand training to pastors who don't have access to traditional seminary degrees. ITEN's M. K. and P. B. and some other EPC pastors involved in global theological education will attend. **Pray that we'll be in the places for the right conversations to learn & to share.**
- We'll be home to quickly repack and head to V..... to work with our group of 9 men who completed the 12 Ministry Leadership Training Institute Program courses and were approved by their denomination to be the lecturers for the new group of 30 church leaders. As coaches we'll guide the men through the first two courses: Understanding, Applying, and Communicating the Bible, and Introduction to Spiritual Formation. This gives them opportunity to deepen their grasp of content and process together how to teach well. The materials have been newly translated into mother tongue of this people group which takes away a barrier of understanding. **Thanks for your financial giving which makes this possible.** While in H...., leaders of the Bible College also want to brainstorm ideas of training broadly across their churches with us. **Pray for us to listen well and point to possible resources.** Our goal has been and is to see II Timothy 2:2 applied: "What you have heard from me, impart to faithful others who can teach others also." **We are working ourselves out of a job!**
- Taking advantage of being on the other side of the world and our current good health and mobility, we'll take 2 weeks of our allotted vacation time to see sights and refresh.

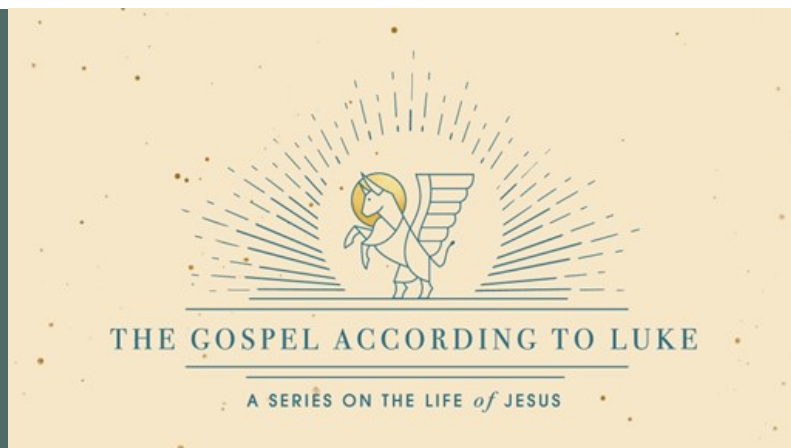

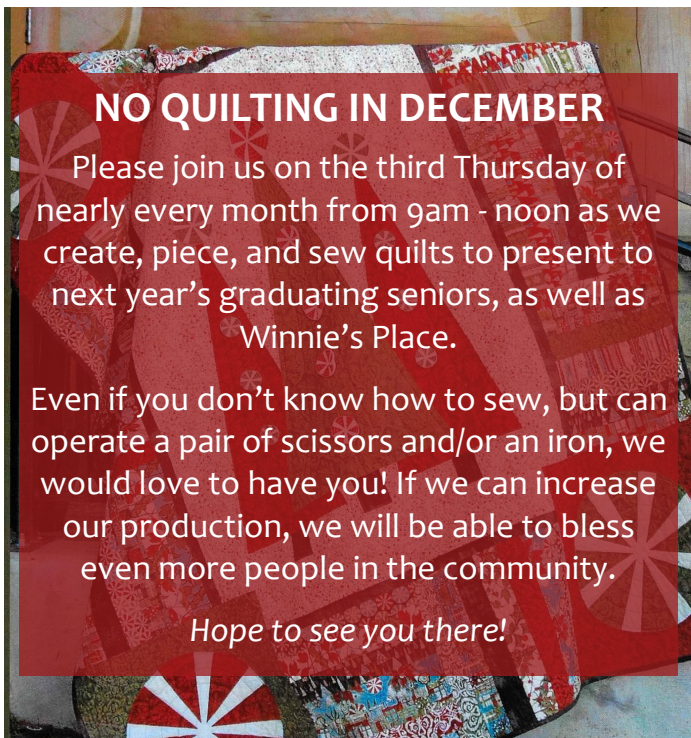

A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was first held at King's College Chapel on Christmas Eve 1918. It was planned by Eric Milner-White, who had just been appointed Dean after experience as an army chaplain; this experience convinced him that the Church of England needed more imaginative worship....

The 1918 service was adapted from an order drawn up by E. W. Benson.... Since then the spoken parts, which provide the backbone of the service, have only occasionally been changed. The service was first broadcast in 1928 and, with the exception of 1930, it has been broadcast annually, even during the Second World War... ([source document](#))
