



RESOLVED: TO GROW IN 2026

Whether you're looking for help with your New Years resolutions, or don't even bother to make them in the first place, the Apostle Peter has one in mind for you. With all of his apostolic authority, Peter gives this concluding word to his second letter, “*You therefore, beloved... take care that you are not carried away with the error of lawless people and lose your own stability*” ([2 Peter 3:17](#)). In other words, keep steady in your Christian life - and how can we do that in 2026? Peter continues, “*But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ*” ([2 Peter 3:18](#)).

Just like regular health physicals are good for the body, regular spiritual check-ups are needed for the soul. Am I content in my Christian walk? Am I growing in holy living? Do I know the Word of God as much as I desire to? Am I learning more of Christ, so that I might trust Him more? Am I quick to forgive others? Do I hold too closely to material possessions? If you're like me these questions reveal that there are many areas of my life that God is still at work in my heart. That is true for all of us. This side of heaven, every Christian believer is still a work in progress.

That work of God the Holy Spirit is called sanctification. It's the life-long process where God is growing, changing, and making us into more mature disciples of Christ. But that work of sanctification is also something that we are to give ourselves to with sincere efforts, which is why Peter can say “grow!” Against this backdrop is the glorious promise that God began a good work in us, and He will complete it ([Philippians 1:6](#)). Even for all of our sincere pursuits, the process of sanctification is laced together with God's grace that will never leave us or forsake us.

So, before you go about determining that you would like to read the Bible more in 2026 and formulating a plan (included in this newsletter!), or any other discipline to help you grow this year, remember that sanctification has three meanings in the Bible.

Past tense: You have been sanctified. God has made you His own in Christ. You have been saved. You are a saint in indissoluble union with Christ.

Present tense: You are being sanctified. That salvation is being worked out over days, months, years, decades – to make you into the likeness of Jesus.

Future tense: You will be sanctified. One glorious day, the work will be complete and you will be made perfectly holy to stand before His majesty and live forever. You will be saved.

With that in mind, we can have confidence that we put our hands to the plow of our spiritual growth, knowing first of all that God has empowered us by the Spirit to create the desire, supply the power, and produce the results of His work of sanctification.

I look forward to seeing how we will grow together in Christ in 2026, and I leave you with the words of the always beautiful Puritan prayer book, the “Valley of Vision”: “*I launch my bark on the unknown*

waters of this year, with Thee, O Father, as my harbor, Thee, O Son, at my helm, Thee, O Holy Spirit, filling my sails."

To Him be glory both now and to the day of eternity ([2 Peter 3:18](#))!







Macy* walked into the center clearly angry, and the pregnancy test appointment was tough. There were no smiles or even a lift in spirit as we talked with her. Her volunteer advocate came out of the room unsure of what to say that could possibly help Macy see her way out of an abortion. **Macy felt like abortion was her only option; she matter-of-factly stated that, “He don’t want it, and neither do I.”** What a testament to the impact of the father of the baby! Macy was abortion determined, but agreed to come back a few days later for an ultrasound. This was a glimmer of God beginning to work! On her exit survey that day, **Macy shared that at Pregnancy Resources, “They listen and respect you.”**

At the ultrasound Macy still seemed angry and spoke little. Her nurse noticed that Macy was “guarded” but seemed to soften a little as the appointment progressed. Macy showed no reaction to the baby on the screen. But then, **she calmly said that she didn’t need information about the abortion pill because she had “decided to keep it.”** Macy then asked for help getting connected with a local doctor! God is so good!

During a follow-up phone call a few days later, the nurse encouraged Macy and reminded her that she was strong enough to parent. After a pause, Macy said, “Thanks for that. That’s what my family has been telling me, too.”

Not every story at Pregnancy Resources has a happy ending. Sometimes we don’t get to know the ending – and all we can do is hope and pray. **But today, Macy reminded us that hearts do soften and lives are saved.** Macy’s story is a story of God’s faithfulness and it serves as an encouragement to us all. Thank you for making life-affirming care possible for Macy when her child’s life was hanging in the balance.

This term at Asha services we have been looking at Genesis 1-5. We have seen how sin has spoiled the perfect world and all the thoughts in man's heart are against God. Thank you for your prayers and support this year and for all the previous years as well! This month we have spoken many times and to many people about the joy we have in Jesus our Savior, who rescues and restores. A few specific ways that has happened:

- Over 20 Christmas assemblies have taken place in schools in the borough - C involved directly in 7 of them. It involved a lot of running around in costume, pretending to ride a camel, throwing sheep.. One teammate was told by a little Bengali friend of her daughter that the girl went home and told her family the WHOLE story! We are **praying** that there are many more happenings like that, where the story is retold and spread and pondered.
- S went to a Christmas carol and outreach event in N....., the borough next to T.... H....., on a Saturday, in the square outside a huge shopping mall. Many local Christians came together to sing and to share about Jesus. At the event S was able to talk with a man who had many questions and wants to meet again and talk more.
- At the ESOL Christmas party, the whole class heard the story of Jesus birth and why He came. They were also all invited to the Asha Christmas service today. Some of the ladies were asking about it even before getting the invite, because they remembered it from last year and wanted to come again.
- Over 90 people were at our Asha Christmas service! They saw the children act out the Christmas story, heard the gospel message explained, sang and listened to Christmas songs in Sylheti, and ate a tasty meal together. Many times we get large numbers at Christmas, but then we don't see them again on a weekly basis. **Please pray that some will decide to come back next Sunday, and also pray that the message heard today would be something they go home and think about.** There were many people videoing the songs. **Pray they get shared widely!**

REMEMBER THOSE CONSOLATIONS??? - M & S UPDATE

Remember our last newsletters? where we were talking about the consolations within our disappointments?

In this season of "thanksgiving", we want to share yet another disappointment and consolation that fills us with MUCH gratitude at the present time.

As many of you will remember, M... was scheduled to be in E..... teaching a course on the History of Muslim-Christian relations. From there he was going to B..... where he and a colleague, Rev. S W, were to assess our partnership with B..... as a potential hub of ITEN ministry. Well, the Lord had other plans.

After M... taught his first full day of class at the E..... Theological College, he developed a violent bout of food poisoning. Somewhere around midnight, he had two hotel staff take him to an emergency room in A.... A.... for treatment. He was so dehydrated, that they could not get a needle in his collapsed veins (many pricks). He finally told them to give him a rehydration drink, and to wait before sticking him again. That did the trick and the IV was started.

But, 20 minutes into the IV drip, he began violently shaking - more like bouncing-off-his-bed shaking. He let the ER staff know that he feared hypothermia and had the presence of mind to ask if the saline had been refrigerated. They assured him it had not. Still, the hospital triage staff left the IV in for 2 hours, after which Mike fell asleep. He woke in the wee hours of the morning and the shivering had stopped. It wasn't until he got home and rested a few days, that he began to process the whole event. The "ER" was basically a garage with a metal roof awning, completely open to the outside air (see the photo). By the time he began triage, the outside temperature was 48-50 Fahrenheit. He was treated in a curtained off area near the open entrance with no heat (the nurses wore coats). They did have blankets for him, but the saline solution was stored at "room" temperature which was 50 or below--not good for dehydration from violent food poisoning. He's quite sure he was in hypothermia and he suspects that while he was out, they paused the saline drip or perhaps switched it out. They did eventually admit him to a room in the hospital, where they monitored him and ran all kinds of tests. He began to stabilize within 24 hours, and we got him on a return flight as soon as he was able to travel. I met him in Chicago, and we flew back to Seattle together.

He has been resting and regaining his equilibrium for a week now.

He was terribly disappointed not to complete his responsibilities and exploration trip to Ba....., but we are consoled that the Lord - through His people in E..... and through WO's leadership- cared for M... and that he is home safe and sound with us this holiday season. We do not take any of that for granted! M... will need to finish the E..... course (probably via Zoom) and we are exploring when M... and S.... can get to in 2026. Do **pray** with us for the Lord to guide the process.

As we close this bit of news, we are reminded that our days are numbered. We are so very thankful to be in relationship with our God and Father through the Lord Jesus and in counsel of the Holy Spirit, and we trust you will experience that same loving care in this Thanksgiving season. He loves us and leads us and holds us in all things- in community with family and friends, and when we're alone. To Him be praise! and to each of you- thank you for praying, for supporting, for loving us along the way!

We give thanks for:

- Kind and gracious E..... brothers and sisters who stayed with M... and never left his side: even the college president spent hours by his bedside and was in touch with S.... on his progress. God does have his people everywhere!
- Sufficient medical care to revive M... and re-hydrate him.
- A good mission agency (World Outreach) that worked hard to help get M... home.
- The assurance that though M... did not accomplish what he started out to do, God was neither alarmed nor disappointed. All things work together for good to those who love him and are called according to his purpose.

Sharing the gospel during a war

I have a new friend, Prof. V B, at K D University in I....-F....., U..... He had invited me to give a lecture there last year and asked me to return. When I did, he was surprised. He said, ‘Honestly, I did not expect that a foreigner with your experience and opportunities would want to return to us. But you did! We are so grateful.’

I think V.... is what I would call a nominal Orthodox man with traditional values. When I express my personal faith, convey Christian history in my lecture, and initiate a prayer over our lunch, he receives it well. He is thankful that an American is visiting them and teaching about their own history in an inspiring way, along with providing practical help to their students. He remarks about my enthusiasm and joy (which we know comes from the Lord!).

During my lectures, faculty and students hear about the sixth-century Christian statesman Cassiodorus, C. S. Lewis and Dorothy Sayers at Oxford, other Christians in history and big Christian ideas that shaped Europe. Their eyes open in a new way to the power of Christianity for both personal and national development. May they see the Lord!

U.....

Sept/Oct U..... trip

On this trip, J L and I traveled together in the EERF van across the border from P..... into U....., through several cities, and back to P..... It gave us the opportunity to talk for many hours, sharpen and inspire our vision and plans, enjoy great times of Scripture reading and prayer together while heading down the highway, as well as rich fellowship. I am so grateful for our 25-year relationship and ministry partnership! We always build each other up! In L..., U....., I preached twice from Isaiah 61 about our being ‘oaks of righteousness’. People told me they were greatly encouraged by long-term vision and assurance of God’s promises. They said they were inspired to go deeper into discipleship.

Also, in L..., I taught a full day at L... Theological Seminary on the topic ‘Christian Service and Leadership in Society’. Afterward, I enjoyed a few hours in lively conversation with the seminary president. This was another of many installments of teaching throughout U..... to help the pastors and churches in post-Soviet territory come up from ‘the basement’ of the USSR and faithfully serve ‘above ground’ amid society, applying the gospel at a new level. They are not underground churches anymore—but active and serving! Thank the Lord!

As mentioned above, I was at K D University in I.....-F....., where I gave lectures two days on the 'History of the Universities and the Classical Christian Methodology of Education', including practical study methods and skills. Prof. V B and one of the deans gave me a warm welcome. They surprised me by presenting me with a Visiting Professor certificate as they introduced me to the students, confirming my official appointment to this position. Over coffee and meals, we discussed ongoing forms of partnership. I was so glad they asked me, 'Where is your friend, J?' (He was in other meetings across town while I was at the university.) Because of the relationship I formed at the university, J was also welcomed and had the opportunity to explain to them about the Christian O A. They expressed their desire to collaborate with Jaroslaw in the future.

K D University was founded by a Greek Catholic priest whose vision was to pursue higher education based on Christianity. It is a private university and accredited by the U..... government. Based on common traditional values, there is an open atmosphere to me as an evangelical Protestant. Not much work has been done in the past by evangelicals to engage in this university. So, I thank God for this opportunity!

J and I then drove to K.... He was speaking at a conference, and I was doing a seminar for teachers, parents, and church leaders on 'Family as an Atmosphere for Sharing Values and Fostering an Educational

Lifestyle in Your Home'. This aims to respond to the disruption of education and family life caused by the war. In the past few years, Christians for U..... (led by J) launched supplemental schooling programs in the churches in nine cities. I did teacher training back then to help start it. The programs serve families already in the church as well as U..... refugee families displaced from eastern U..... The church I was speaking at in V..... has about **400 of these refugees in its care, most not yet followers of Jesus.**

When the seminar started, the pastor said enthusiastically, 'Wow, so many of the parents of students here are not yet members of our church.' We could see by their attentiveness, questions, and emotions that the seminar touched them in a strong way. There were some great personal conversations for an hour afterwards. **Please pray for those who saw God's goodness when the church provided them education and a loving environment that they will see even more—that Jesus died for them to give them forgiveness and a whole new life.**

I preached in a large church in K... on Sunday. It was an inspiring time! Its leaders are very active in the reformation movement and many projects serving in society, including chaplaincy, support for soldiers and their families, and ministries in the city. They also have a strong online presence. Pastor V..... told me the message I brought gave **substantial support to his vision for deep discipleship** in the church and that he would go back over it carefully to apply it. In the church, I was greeted by many (including the pastors) who are studying at the Christian O A and know me from there, as well as preaching in this church regularly. I could see again how the network of Christian leadership grows!

In the background of all these travels and events is the **new 'normal' life for U.....** For example, when we walked out of the church building, the air raid sirens blared. The pastor then called to see if the restaurant we were heading to would be closed because of the air alert. Some people huddled under the overpass for cover for a while. When we sat down a half hour later to eat lunch, we saw on our phones that a missile had indeed struck the S... region. In fact, during that Saturday/Sunday period, was attacked by 550 missiles and drones with numerous strikes. I also noticed when we had entered K... that soldiers were right next to busy rush-hour traffic in the city center setting up large 50-caliber anti-drone guns on tripods on the shoulder of the road for an evening of defending the country. All of this is 'normal' for U..... **Chronic stress. Disruption. Uncertainty. Deaths of soldiers and civilians that they know. Please pray for U.....**

Throughout the trip, J and I took advantage of the opportunity to distribute thousands of copies of prayer guides and other literature provided by EE Leadership Foundation to churches and Christian organizations for distribution in their cities. We did this at L..., I....-F....., K..., Z....., R...., and L..... It was encouraging to see firsthand the volunteer spirit of the churches.

U..... project work

In October, I recorded a lecture for the Christian O A. Its title is 'A History of European Universities: Classical

Christian education methodology for U.....'s renewal.' I am excited about this, because this talk imparts vision and action for producing self-educating, self-governed thinkers who have tools of learning and know how to study, research, and reason, think and read critically, and write and speak with eloquence and persuasion. All of this is necessary for evangelicals to advance in scholarship and engage at higher levels of service in society.

As I discussed the past few years of the Christian O A with J, he recalled that 3,000 students have taken the 7-month course, and 1,500 completed all the exams and received a certificate from the National University of O..... A..... Another 500+ students are enrolled right now, and include pastors, church workers, university students, public officials, social workers, professors, businessmen, and various professionals—and not just Protestants, but some Catholics and Orthodox, too. As with my other COA lectures, because it was recorded, this lecture will be used by future students, too.

Also in October, at the invitation of Prof. I B, I delivered a live online lecture for International University of E..... and H..... (abbreviated from Ukrainian as MEGU) in Rivne, Ukraine. It was the beginning of collaborations I am forming with them. My topic was family values and building multi-generationally strong families for the health of the nation. About 45 students and 8 faculty members from various departments attended. Thank the Lord, I had lots of positive feedback and questions.

The Dean of International Partnerships said:

'I have never heard this before, but it is so powerful and influential for me personally and for U..... today. We need this! Thank you so much!'

After the meeting, I was approached by two students who are in the master's program. Both are working in evangelical non-profit and humanitarian organizations and knew me from my Christian O A lectures. Again, we see the advancement of believers working in various spheres of society. The university requested that I come visit them in the future, give a lecture, and form a collaborative relationship.

B.....

Z D

Z is a strong Christian leader who was led to Christ by J and nurtured by my pastor friends in B..... who led the reformation movement. I have known him for about 20 years.

On 11 September, the day after Charlie Kirk was killed, my phone started lighting up with texts from B..... friends. They said it appeared that the release of our dear brother Z D from prison was imminent. Soon it was confirmed, and we were amazed and rejoicing! Upon his release, we can testify that Z was strong in spirit and deeply devoted to the Lord—just like before. He is, in J's words, 'an ironman' by God's grace.

For many years, Z led the largest pro-freedom movement organization for the younger generations in B..... Tens of thousands participated or were influenced by it, and it is a visibly Christian organization. As an out-front leader in 'the last dictatorship in Europe', Z paid the price of many unjust arrests. His several long-term imprisonments total about 8 years. Z was most recently in prison for 3.5 years (released 11 September 2025). During that time, his wife N (also a leader in this movement) was serving a house-arrest sentence of 3.5 years, while caring for her four children. In fact, she was pregnant when she and Z were imprisoned. As a result, Z has never seen in-person his now 3-year-old son, Daniel.

They need prayer! Z was, with complete surprise, taken from the prison and driven with 51 others to L....., where they were forcibly deported from their country. He had no documents and almost no possessions. Friends helped him. When N was released from her sentence about a month later, she was able to drive directly to L..... to see Z (after they were apart for 3.5 years!). They spent about two weeks together. But then she returned to B..... to prepare for her and their children to move—to collect whatever possessions they can, leave their house and B..... permanently, meet Z in L....., and eventually move their family to P..... So many things need to happen for them to make this family reunion and relocation move possible. **Please pray! May the Lord do amazing things**

to heal and strengthen this family and provide for their next season as a family and in the Lord's service.

One more thing. I realized that the day Z was released, I was working on a sermon on Isaiah 61, where we find the words (v.2) 'to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound'. Providence!

Mentoring

I continue to meet with Z F and A K from B..... I recently provided two mentoring consultations for a U..... pastor's son, V G, who is doing university studies and research on church history. He, and his older brother P G (who I also mentor) are next generation Christian U..... scholars. It is inspiring to watch them grow intellectually and as Christian leaders.

I was overjoyed to receive news a month ago from S T in M...., B..... In 2014-2019, I had provided some mentoring to S and a group of other university student ministries leaders working with IFES. S was a student of mine for a course at the seminary in M.....

S is now leading the IFES ministry in B..... It is wonderful to hear this report about their summer camp for university students:

'Some students who attended the camps by chance held a Bible in their hands for the first time. For instance, a student named A from M.... was simply seeking leisure activities and came across an advertisement for one of our camps on Instagram. This marked her first encounter with Christians, and she appeared genuinely surprised to learn that there are still people who believe in God. However, following the camp, she joined a Bible study group. A few weeks ago, a student named S was baptized in P..... She had been actively participating in a Bible study group for the past six months and has since joined a local church. Student D from B.... first attended a Bible study group approximately a year ago and is scheduled to be baptized this coming Sunday! Approximately 220 Christian students are currently participating in the RESTART student conference. We are doing our utmost to inspire and equip them to serve as missionaries in their universities during the upcoming academic year. Topics such as 'How to read the Bible with a non-believing friend?' 'How to organize an evangelistic project?' and 'How to respond to challenging questions about faith and God?' are among the many issues we are exploring at RESTART.'

It is important to remember that the seeds you and I have sown—even many years ago—grow and bear fruit over time, long after we have forgotten about the work we did to sow them.

I cannot safely enter B..... right now, so I am grateful for what I sowed there when I could. I also thank God for the ministry I continue to have with B..... who have had to flee to P..... and L.....

Other IFR and ITEN work

V.....

Back in July, I was online to do a final teacher training review of my MLTI course on community development. It involved two evenings online late night (because of the time zone difference) observing those I had taught previously as they now taught my course to other pastors. They didn't even ask me for help with a single question. I just watched for hours with a smile on my face. They got this! Yay!

It was a delight because it was part of finalizing the five-year process of our team's MLTI teacher training program in V....., under E McC's coordination. On 25 September, I received an encouraging message from our former in-country V..... coordinator of the MLTI program. He reported another story about how a church applied what was taught in my community development course and built a road for their community. That meant that children could go to school and adults could travel and work more efficiently. The road-building work was funded by and done by church volunteers. Their light shined through their good works. May their community see it and give glory to God.

P.....

I helped M K with fundraising for earthquake relief, after the terrible losses of life and property in P..... I was grateful that one of our supporting churches, River Oaks Community Church in Clemmons, NC, generously and helpfully provided funds to P Mission Society to meet this need. P Mission Society's work opens the doors to provide this help in some of the least-reach and least accessible parts of P..... in the name of Jesus.

M.....

River Oaks Community Church also helped with M..... earthquake relief. The Reformed Presbyterian Church in M..... applied the aid to help churches in B..., B....., D...., and M... All these churches are reaching hard-to-reach people groups. The aid included repairs to walls and other structural elements damaged by the earthquake, as well as rice and other food.

E and I also enjoyed a trip to Maryland in September to spend time with T and A T, our long-time friends and ministry partners from M..... They were in the US to visit their two sons who live in the US. They also necessarily refreshed their own green card status. What a joy to see them!

Their son J was in a horrible car accident and is recovering from a broken back (he can walk now and is in rehab). Their son D is a secret service officer protecting the president at the White House and on his trips (wow!).

Their report about M..... is that the civil war and military control remain heavy and difficult. I got an update on the M.. in R..... State. The M.. are a previously unreached people group reached with the gospel by T and their denomination. ITEN had the privilege to help with training the M.. and other pastors, and as part of that, I made over a dozen trips there over the years. Some sweet news is that the M.. started four new churches during the difficult civil war period, even though they had been forced from their homes and lost their church buildings in the civil war conflict. Many churches in C... State were burned, but now the People's Militia holds the area, and they have better ministry opportunities. The seminary is partially operational and relying more on online teaching these days, because Y..... is still held strongly by the military.

Cyprus

Since our last prayer letter, E and enjoyed a fruitful time of team meetings for ITEN and EPC World Outreach in Cyprus for a week at our 'Family Gathering' of all the WO missionaries. This event happens every 3-4 years and is a special time of fellowship, spiritual renewal, care, and refreshment for our EPC missionaries. We enjoyed this time of renewing long-held relationships and bonding in new ones. We are so grateful to you and EPC for providing this!

Visiting supporting churches

In the past few months, E and I have visited and preached in supporting churches in VA, NJ, IL, MI, and NY. These face-to-face visits with those who affirm us, believe in what we are doing, and support us are encouraging to us and a great opportunity to share all the Lord is doing through our partnership. Thank you, supporting churches! We have plans to visit several more of you in months ahead.

Family

E continues her fruitful work for the Crisis Pregnancy Centers of Tidewater. Some of her many stories are about sharing the gospel with their clients, including two Muslim couples recently. There are also sweet stories about mothers who decided to keep their babies.

We are so excited that our son D and his wife K have another baby on the way, due in March! It will be our 8th grandchild! Yay! In October, I enjoyed a special few days in Arizona with my parents and sisters and their families. All the kids and grandkids (except those in Reno, NV) will be with us at our home for Thanksgiving. Wonderful! E and I will travel to Reno for Christmas celebrations there. Again, wonderful!

"Leave me alone with God as much as may be. As the tide draws the waters close up on the shore, make me an island, set apart, alone with you, God, Holy to You. Then with the turning of the tide, prepare me to carry your presence to the busy world beyond, the world that rushes in on me, till the waters come again and fold me back to you." - The Prayer of St. Aiden (by Andy Raine - written about Holy Island)

This is a prayer that was shared with us by our guide during the last day of my pilgrimage in Scotland back at the start of May. The reason the prayer was so vivid and powerful when I heard it was that our final destination, the Holy Island of Lindisfarne, is an island... only sometimes. When the tide comes in, it becomes an island, and when the tide goes out, the road is revealed from underwater and the quaint little town is reconnected to all the tourists/travelers.

I'm about to take a hard right here... but stick with me.

This Fall was busy, really, really busy. And we came home from Thanksgiving desperate for rest, for less, for room to breathe.... so we made a commitment to slow down for the month of December. Sounds great, right?! But wait, we still have five kids that we're homeschooling, we still have ministry responsibilities, it's still Christmas season (one of the busiest times of the year!), and that's without anything extra. You fill in the blanks. You know how crazy and exhausting this time can be.

The mercy we're experiencing from God over the past couple weeks though is that He's blessing our attempts to slow down, but just in waves. If I'm not careful, I can get angry that we haven't reached a space of total peace/rest, but what I'm realizing is that, like Holy Island of Lindisfarne, life isn't meant to be lived completely on the island OR in "the busy world beyond." The question is: how can we ready our hearts to receive the moments of solitude with God and intimacy of family, while also welcoming His call back to community and reconnection to the busy world? How can we be okay with the waves? I pray that our family and yours would release control this Christmas season and welcome the ebb and flow of God's tides.

Last notes here... part of our commitment to less is that we decided not to write up and send out our annual ministry mailing. We will probably send a mailing out in January or February, but that's to be decided :)

The challenge with the choice not to send you a letter is that we still need to communicate that our financial support has waned this year and our budget has increased quite a bit due to insurance, admin fees, and inflation. ADVENT IN CHICAGO: WAITING, WORKING, AND HOPING TOGETHER - JEFFREY LANCASTER UPDATE

Hi friends,

Every December I'm reminded that Advent begins in the dark. As Fleming Rutledge says, it's the season that dares to look honestly at the shadows within us and around us while refusing to believe that darkness has the final word. Advent trains our souls to wait—actively, expectantly—for God's arrival. *"Little Advent, little Christmas. Great Advent, great Christmas."*

This year, as Cathy and I continue our long-eyed, long-aimed work of planting a church in the most unchurched part of Chicago, Advent feels especially personal. Church planting is Advent. It is watching and waiting. It is working and hoping. It is—day after day—putting our small lives inside God's much larger story and trusting that Christ will show up and do what only He can do.

Tish Harrison Warren writes that Advent collapses time. Past, present, and future meet as we stand with ancient Israel longing for the Messiah, with the early church proclaiming, *"Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again"* and with the global church today waiting for His final renewal of all things. Advent reminds us that "help is on the way," even when life feels painfully slow or deeply uncertain.

And honestly, some days here in Chicago feel exactly like that kind of slow, sacred waiting.
Waiting for hearts to soften.
Waiting for conversations to open.
Waiting for seekers to say, "Maybe I'll come back next week."
Waiting for the right people to join the launch team.



Waiting for God to breathe life into something new in this city we love.

But Advent also reminds me that we don't wait alone. In Christ, and through the prayers of friends like you, we "join our voices with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven" as we seek to carry the light of Jesus into a neighborhood full of beautiful people who desperately need Him—even if they don't yet know it.

We need your prayers now more than ever.

- A faithful core of missionally-minded believers to join us in Lakeview/Wrigleyville
- Open doors with seekers, skeptics, and neighbors

HELP A GRANDPA FINISH STRONG WITH YEAR-END GIVING!

Hey Gang,

A few weeks ago, during a Sunday morning worship service, Cathy and I joined our voices with a local congregation to sing a hymn I've sung more times than I can count: *Holy God, We Praise Your Name*.

I'm sure you've had this experience—sometimes you're singing a song (any song, really, but especially a worship song) and suddenly the lyrics land on you in a completely new way. Almost like you're hearing it for the very first time. That morning, it was the third verse that stopped me in my tracks:

*All the saints join in the strain
as your sacred name they hallow;
prophets swell the glad refrain,
faithful from all nations follow;
and from morn to set of sun,
through the church the song goes on.*

In that moment, it felt as though God was insisting—through these lyrics—that I slow down and be filled with awe. Awe that my life (our lives, as Christ-followers) actually plays a role in God's great musical enterprise—His ongoing work to keep the gospel's music alive and moving across the world and throughout the ages.

Every local expression of Christ's body keeps that song humming wherever God has planted His people—whether in a dense urban neighborhood, a small town, a suburb, a village, a prison, a college campus, a hospital ward, a senior living facility, etc.

God is using His people, in a very real sense, as his “recording artists,” filling the airwaves of the world with the liberating sounds and messages of his hope. And this gospel music symphony—both literally and figuratively—takes on every style imaginable: lofty and classical, earthy and blues-like, raw and soulful, funky and joyful, old-country honest (forgive me, lovers of modern country!), poetically real like good rap, driving like classic rock, and storytelling like a Dylan ballad.

It’s music that carries every theme of God’s Big Story: a glorious creation, a tragic fall, a rescuing gospel, a wilderness journey, a slow restoration, and a future promised-land world made whole again.

As I sang that third stanza, all of this came rushing through my soul. And I found myself whispering to our risen Christ:

“Lord Jesus, help me be a part of keeping your music alive in Chicago.

Let me sing your story—in all its fullness, with all its notes, in a way that speaks both honestly and hopefully into Your world.”

This is Advent—the season in the life of the church when we join our voices with believers across the centuries, singing in anticipation of Christ’s arrival. His first coming in Bethlehem, his continual comings into our world and our lives even now, and his final coming when all things are made new. We worship a God who keeps showing up—faithfully, graciously, surprisingly—in his world and in our stories.

And one of the primary ways God plays His music into the ears of the world is through regular, ordinary, broken-yet-redeemed followers of Jesus. People like us. People being renewed, praying, showing up, pouring our lives into others, embodying the gospel melody of King Jesus—the One who “comes to make His blessings flow far as the curse is found.”

Through your prayers and financial support, you help us keep that music humming—over the airwaves of Chicago’s neighborhoods, in conversations around dinner tables, in offices and coffee shops, in small gatherings where seekers are gently finding their way toward hope.

As we look toward 2026, I’m praying boldly for a strong year-end—specifically, **\$100,000 above and beyond our regular monthly support.** That’s not a random number. It directly fuels real ministry with real people:

- the unchurched young adult who shows up to dinner carrying big questions,
- the burned-out professional who needs a pastor to sit across from them with a cup of coffee and a listening heart,
- the neighbor walking through grief,
- the artist wandering their way toward faith,
- the person who quietly whispers, “Can we talk?”

Every dollar helps us stay present in Chicago—hosting our Wednesday dinners and Bible studies, gathering friends and neighbors for community-building events, shepherding seekers, cultivating my chaplaincy ministry at WeWork, extending mercy in our city, and continuing to gather the launch team we’ve been praying for.

WE NEED A STRONG DECEMBER.

If God has blessed you this year, would you consider making a generous year-end gift to our Chicago church-planting work? Your support truly makes ministry possible. No gift is too small—and for some, this may be the year to make an especially meaningful investment in the gospel’s work here.

And on a mucho joyful personal note—in case you haven’t heard—Cathy and I are about to step into a brand-new season. Jeffrey Jr. and his wife, Anne Russell, are expecting a baby on April 30th. There’s a new kind of song in our hearts these days, as we wait with wonder for this little one’s arrival.

So yes—it seems I’m slowly becoming a “grandpa-ing church planter.” And my prayer is that the church God raises up here in Chicago will be the kind of church that our grandchild—and his/her contemporaries yet unborn—would want to be part of. A church helping to keep God’s music alive in the world.



REDEMPTIVE-HISTORICAL BIBLE READING PLAN

Each year Pastor Zach provides a new reading plan to help equip you to spend time reading through God's Word. This year he has chosen a redemptive-historical reading plan from Greg Lanier, who is an associate professor of New Testament at Reformed Theological Seminary, Orlando (full-time) and as associate pastor at River Oaks Church (PCA) (part-time).



Annual Bible reading plans are great. But there are tradeoffs. They can be oppressive for some, and they require a heavy load of reading spread equally across all chapters and books with little time to reflect, pause, connect dots, etc. One may not, at the end of reading the Bible through in a year, emerge with a much better understanding of the 1,189 chapters you just read. The plan provided on the next few pages and linked to the image takes a different approach meant to complement (not replace) the normal one. It curates the key chapters of the OT that help frame the flow of redemptive history (how God has worked in history to bring about his plan of salvation). Most sections of OT readings include NT chapters that shed light on fulfillment in Christ. You can go at your own pace and pause however often you want to dig deeper and reflect on what you are reading. At the end, you will have a solid grounding in the entire message of the Bible, which can then help you revisit those 1,189 chapters afresh.

In the year ahead, ask God each day to speak directly to you from the Scripture passages you read. Be expectant, and let your continual exposure to God's Word reshape your attitudes and behavior as you gain a better understanding of every part of His written testimony to us.

1. Creation

Few things are more foundational to Christianity than the doctrine of the special creation of all things by the Triune God, with the Father, Son, and Spirit all at work in the unified act of creation.



Come young. Come old. Bless you for considering this, as many hands make light work.


